



## CHAIR'S MESSAGE



First and foremost, our thoughts and well wishes go to every individual of the Australian performing arts industry who have been impacted so significantly by COVID-19. City Recital Hall has a proud history of presenting our country's finest musicians and performers and we take solace knowing the music they have streamed into our homes over recent months will shortly return, as live concert experiences, to the City Recital Hall stage.

We farewelled Elaine Chia in February after four years as CEO of City Recital Hall with heartfelt thanks for her distinguished service as our inaugural CEO since January 2016. The artistic and organisational foundations Elaine developed are again reflected in this report and are testament to her dedication and passion for our growth. We warmly welcomed Justin Boschetti to the position in May and we look forward to the future direction of City Recital Hall under Justin's leadership.

Our positive financial result for 2020, a surplus of \$284,500, is a direct result of the company's profitable programming activity in the first three quarters of the reporting year along with our diligent reserves policy and conservative budget forecasting. The Board of Directors have therefore assured City Recital Hall Limited as a going concern and recognise the Australian Government's JobKeeper subsidy as a vital underpinning of our operational and financial sustainability at this time. While the year has been an interrupted one, we saw strong growth in programming activity with 206 concerts and events achieving a combined total audience attendance of 126,574. We closed City Recital Hall temporarily on 16th March 2020. The Board and I want to particularly thank our work colleagues for their support during these dark months. They have tirelessly worked to maintain our organisation and we are extremely grateful for these efforts. We reopened on 5th September 2020 and now look forward to the return of all our Key Presenters – Australian Chamber Orchestra, Australian Brandenburg Orchestra, Musica Viva, Pinchgut Opera and Sydney Symphony Orchestra - in the months ahead.

We continue to reach new audiences with our valued media partners *TimeOut* and *The Saturday Paper* and we acknowledge *SBS* for their three years of partnership as well as our continued corporate partners AV1, JPJ Audio, Chalk Hill and Claymore Wines facilitated by Fisher Fine Wines and Young Henrys.

It is a great honour to work with a Board of Directors whose valued counsel continues to ensure City Recital Hall's ongoing cultural, social and economic viability. In 2019, the Board welcomed Rachel Launders and Paul Mason and we farewelled Maria Sykes, Elizabeth Fullerton and Helen Bauer. I thank them all for their dedication and express warm appreciation for their service over the years. We are immensely grateful for the City of Sydney's ongoing support in a renewed five-year funding agreement as our Principal Sponsor. This commitment allows us to continue to provide residents and visitors to Sydney the experience of world class acoustics and performances in the very heart of our city. Our sincere gratitude to the Lord Mayor of Sydney, Clover Moore and Concillors of City of Sydney for their encouragement and advocacy for our success in managing this key cultural asset.

The year saw many programming highlights including our 20th anniversary event celebrations on 30 October 2019. The day saw a range of activities from back of house tours, a talk by venue architect, Andrew Andersons AO, and a televised Sydney Flash Mob Choir, culminating in a specially curated performance by Megan Washington supported by Electric Fields, Topolgy and Luke Howard. The return of new music festival Extended Play transformed the venue into multiple performance spaces for almost 100 artists across twelve hours featuring international new piano musician Margaret Leng Tan. And, in January, following the devastating impact of the summer bushfires, Sydney musicians joined forces to support of our relief concert *Music For Our Country* to raise funds for community and wildlife recovery efforts. My sincere thanks to all who so generously gave of their time and talent for this event.

The sudden impact of COVID-19 on the arts sector and society cannot be ignored. The suspension of live performance in March left a void in the lives of artists and concertgoers. The most successful year in City Recital Hall's history was cut abruptly short by the pandemic, though with careful management and the generosity of our donors and audiences, we look forward to returning to live performance soon.

Our Principal Sponsor, City of Sydney, continues to provide essential support and I extend my thanks to the Lord Mayor of Sydney, Clover Moore and Concillors of City of Sydney, Monica Barone, Bill Carter and all the staff across the Creative City and Property teams.

I would like to acknowledge the commitment, hard-work and leadership of the Board, especially acknowledge the tireless dedication of Renata Kaldor AO. Renata has been an invaluable guide during the last few months and has helped me to continually look forward and plan for the future at the other side of the current crisis.

The last year has highlighted the passion of the City Recital Hall team who are so deeply committed to the mission of our company and who continually exceed expectations to ensure we always deliver for our audiences and artists. I would also like to thank Elaine Chia for her leadership and commitment during the past four years as CEO. Elaine's vision has both expanded City Recital Hall's offering and broadened our audiences.

Finally, I would like to personally thank the artists and audience members who have trusted City Recital Hall to deliver the joy and beauty of live music during the last year. As custodians of this magnificent venue, we exist for our artists and audiences. I look forward to welcoming you back.





### TRAINING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

City Recital Hall is committed to fostering the arts professionals of the future through formal traineeships, and to supporting our sector through participation in professional development opportunities.

In conjunction with AV1, Apprenticeship Careers Australia, and ACFIPS, Morgan Higgin and Liam Calcutt commenced Certificate III Live Production and Services Traineeships in August 2019. This program is providing Liam and Morgan with experience in all areas of technical production.

Our Extended Play festival featured emerging artists from the UNSW New Music Collective

# COMMUNETY ENGAGEMENT

### ACCESSIBILITY

City Recital Hall aims to provide exceptional experiences to wide audiences, and accessibility is therefore an ongoing priority through infrastructure and expanding opportunities for attendance for those with specific access needs.

The auditorium is equipped with a hearing loop, accessible seating and the provision of courtesy wheelchairs for all performances. Our website incorporates accessibility features to assist audiences accessing the venue.

Concession priced tickets totalled almost 20% of all tickets sold by City Recital Hall, and 65 Companion Card tickets were issued.

### **CHILDREN AND FAMILIES**

Our commitment to providing events to engage and excite young children, school-aged students and families with 10 performances catering to 5,980 attendees.

Australian Romantic and Classical Orchestra presented two performances of Voyage of Musical Discovery series to an audience including 1,184 high school students.

In conjunction with our presenting partner Gondwana Choirs, we welcomed 230 children to perform on our stage. We also hosted 350 international youth musicians participating in activities by World Projects South Pacific.

Writer and narrator Justine Clarke and composer and conductor George Ellis co-presented with City Recital Hall, to take young audiences on an orchestral journey with Mimi the magpie for a World Premiere performance of *Mimi's Symphony.* 

### FREE AND LOW-COST

This year, 7,403 people attended 35 low cost events and over 5,000 people participated in 20 free events.

This Sounds Like Science, a series of lunchtime talks hosted in partnership with Inspiring Australia (NSW), continued to fascinate audiences with discussions linking science and music by leading Australian researchers. This year's four events covered musical composition by Artificial Intelligence, the mathematics of music, the effect of music on mood, and the neuroscience of musical imagery.

Each of the nine sessions of our popular Sydney Flash Mob Choir events continued to attract a loyal following together with wave of new participants for our free vocal events that combine professionally-led vocal exercises, rehearsals and performances suitable for singers of all levels.

Our long-running lunchtime concert series, A Little Lunch Music, co-curated by City Recital Hall and Kathryn Selby AM, delighted audiences with diverse musical experiences. Thirty-eight contemporary and classical Australian artists performed a range of genres from Beethoven to bluegrass, and tango to jazz in six performances to 4,131 attendees.

Ears to the Ground provided an intimate platform for contemporary artists in our foyers. Two collaborations with Word Travels allowed emerging and life-long amateur poets the opportunity to perform and participate in a intimate and casual environment.

### **MIMI'S SYMPHONY**

During July school holidays we opened our doors to our youngest audiences and their families for the World Premiere of Mimi's Symphony. A new orchestral work for children created by writer and narrator Justine Clarke and composer and conductor George Ellis, Mimi's Symphony was an engaging, lively and distinctly Australian story introducing kids to the different sections of the orchestra as they came together in a joyous symphony.

### SYDNEY CABARET ALL-STAR GALA

City Recital Hall was thrilled to co-present the inaugural Sydney Cabaret Festival's opening night *All-Star Gala* on Friday 5 July. Hosted by Festival Director, Trevor Ashley, the concert featured international stars Jennifer Holliday, Natalie Joy Johnson and Frisky and Mannish alongside Australian cabaret favourites, Phil Scott, Jonathan Biggins, Tim Draxl, and Alison Jiear.

### THE IDEA OF NORTH: HARMONIC HISTRIONIC

We collaborated with Australia's most highly-awarded and best-loved contemporary a cappella group The Idea of North to present their new show, *Harmonic Histrionic*, on Thursday 8 August.

This beautifully-crafted and virtuosic show explored vocal harmony across five centuries from Gregorian Chant, Bach, Madrigals and the Andrew Sisters to contemporary harmony-laden classics, delivered with the group's signature selfdeprecating humour and charm.

### **EXTENDED PLAY**

Following the success of the inaugural festival in 2018, *Extended Play* returned to City Recital Hall on Saturday 31 August. This ambitious 12-hour new music festival, produced by City Recital Hall and Lyle Chan, saw music fill every corner of the venue with five performance spaces created across the four levels.

The event featured 20 performances with local and international artists including Synergy, Sonya Lifschitz and Christine Johnston, Decibel, Halcyon, Australian Voices and Zephyr Quartet. A highlight of the festival was Margaret Leng Tan, the foremost performer of new piano music and the world's first toy piano virtuoso, for her Sydney debut, performing a brand new work by composer George Crumb.

### DAUGHTERS

We were proud to partner with The Big Anxiety and Tammy Brennan to present *Daughters*, an important new work by librettist, Tammy Brennan, on Thursday 17 October. Through the expressive form of the Portuguese fado, guitar and song joined together to tell the real-life stories of women and girls effected by gender violence.

### TAIKOZ: SEVEN FLOWERS

On Friday 18 October, Taikoz returned to the City Recital Hall stage with a brand new show, *Seven Flowers*. This spectacular performance explored the many faceted phases of an artist's life and work, featuring taiko drumming with beautiful song, dynamic movement, colourful percussion, and an evocative stage design.

### 20TH ANNIVERSARY OPEN DAY AND WE ARE TWENTY

Wednesday 30 October marked the 20th anniversary of the opening of City Recital Hall. Festivities kicked off with a *Sydney Flash Mob Choir*, followed by behind the scenes venue tours, a lunchtime concert by Bach Akademie Australia and a talk by City Recital Hall architect, Andrew Andersons AO.

In the evening, we marked the occasion with a very special concert curated by Australian musician and songwriter Megan Washington. For the first time, Megan collaborated with renowned electronic music artists Electric Fields, pianist and composer Luke Howard and indie classical ensemble Topology looking toward the music of tomorrow with a classical crossover theme.

The event featured the World Premiere performance of 'Crystal Clear', with music by Robert Davidson, lyrics by Greta Thunberg and Megan Washington.

### ROBYN ARCHER: THE (OTHER) GREAT AMERICAN SONGBOOK

Following the success of Que Reste T'il and Dancing on the Volcano, Robyn Archer completed her trilogy of performances at City Recital Hall with The (Other) Great American Songbook on Thursday 21 November. Offering a different portrait of America over time through song, Robyn's performance and stories covered everything from the Civil War and The Great Depression to many of its citizens' favourite vices. Accompanied by pianist Michael Morley and George Butrumlis on accordion, Robyn delighted the audience with an epic range of song, including music by Stephen Foster, Rodgers and Hart, Bob Dylan, Pink and Broadway classics.

### MOJO JUJU: NATIVE TONGUE

We were thrilled to present Mojo Juju on Tuesday 26 November, performing her extraordinary album *Native Tongue* in its entirety with her brother and longtime collaborator Steve 'T-Bone' Ruiz de Luzuriaga. Raw, honest, emotional and intrinsically political, the show contemplated her mother's Indigenous heritage, her father's experience as a Filipino immigrant and her own place in the cultural landscape of modern Australia.

### VOICES OF ANGELS: 12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

We rounded off 2019 with our muchloved annual festive season celebration, *Voices of Angels*, co-presented with Gondwana Choirs, with two performances on Monday 15 December and Tuesday 16 December. This year's innovative program paired The Twelve Days of Christmas and their associated gifts with beautiful music from across the centuries. Under the direction of Sam Allchurch, the

### MUSIC FOR OUR COUNTRY: AUSTRALIAN BUSHFIRES FUNDRAISER CONCERT

In response to the devastating summer bushfires, City Recital Hall gathered Sydney's classical music community to present a fundraiser concert on Thursday 30 January in which all performers donated their time. All ticket and bar sales were donated to the Australian Red Cross, WIRES Wildlife Rescue and the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal. Hosted by Margaret Throsby, Music For Our Country featured performances from Elena Kats-Chernin and Tamara Anna Cislowska, William Barton and Veronique Serret, Sydney Philharmonia Choirs, Kathryn Selby, Sally Walker with musicians from Australian Brandenburg Orchestra, Australian Chamber Orchestra and the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Erin Helyard.

### ECHOES OF THE JAZZ AGE

On Thursday 6 February, actor and director John Bell, pianist Simon Tedeschi and special guest Blazey Best transported audiences back to the brilliance and bedazzlement of the Jazz Age. The performance featured the irresistible music of Scott Joplin, Louis Armstrong and James P Johnson, and songs by George Gershwin, Ray Henderson and Fats Waller.

### CONSIDERING MATTHEW SHEPARD

We were proud to collaborate with Sydney Philharmonia Choirs to present Considering Matthew Shepard as part of the 2020 Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras. In 1998 Matthew Shepard, a first-year college student in Wyoming, was kidnapped, beaten and left to die in a brutal anti-gay hate crime that inspired anguish and outrage. Nearly 20 years later, it inspired Craig Hella Johnson to compose Considering Matthew Shepard and create a space for reflection, consideration and unity around Matthew's life and legacy. Directed by Shaun Rennie with Sydney Philharmonia Choirs' VOX ensemble, the semi-staged concert reverberated with hope and serenity, featuring eclectic music that shifts between Lutheran hymnody, chant, blues, cowboy songs and musical theatre

### HANDEL'S MESSIAH

On Saturday 14 March, just days before Covid-19 forced the closure of our venue, it was our great privilege to partner with Sydney Chamber Choir to present Messiah. Handel's Messiah shocked the authorities, disrupted traffic, enthralled its audiences and brought a king to his feet. Composed in just 24 days, it was an instant hit and for almost three centuries has remained one of the world's favourite choral works. An absolute treasure-trove of exquisite arias and glorious choruses. the work was performed at City Recital Hall by Sydney Chamber Choir and The Muffat Collective, conducted by Sam Allchurch.


