

# CHAIR'S MESSAGE



The vision for City Recital Hall is to create exceptional live music experiences for our audiences and artists that reflect the acoustic quality and intimacy of City Recital Hall. This year, COVID-19 challenged our ability to achieve our vision for live perfomances. While we proudly worked with our country's finest musicians and performers to bring music into our homes in novel ways over the start of this financial year, we were thrilled to welcome back our artists and audiences for performances from September 2020. We approach this second wave of lockdowns in Sydney, optimistic that vaccination is our path to returning to regular life, buoyed by the months of live performances we were able to present over the last year and looking forward to presenting a diverse array of live performances in the vear ahead.

We farewelled outgoing Chair Renata Kaldor AO in March after five years of strong leadership as our inaugural Chair. The foundations Renata developed for the City Recital Hall are testament to her dedication and passion for live music performance in Australia. I was honoured to be entrusted with the role of Chair. The Board has welcomed Ronen Ghosh and Scott Phillips as new directors during the year. As a board we look forward to continuing to work with the CEO, Justin Boschetti, and his team to support our vision for City Recital Hall.

Our positive financial result was largely supported by the Federal Government's JobKeeper Subsidy and Create NSW Arts relief grant funding. Prudent financial stewardship by Management and the Board, together with a profitable second half of the year has allowed the business to maintain appropriate cash reserves. City Recital Hall is well placed to weather the second wave of COVID-19 lockdowns with continued support from government funding for the Arts.

Despite the interruptions over the year, we saw strong growth in programming activity with 127 concerts and events, achieving a total audience attendance of 65,590. After re-opening on 5 September 2020, we welcomed back all our Key Presenters - Australian Chamber Orchestra, Australian Brandenburg Orchestra, Musica Viva, Pinchgut Opera and Sydney Symphony Orchestra and embarked on new programming activity that will bear results in the years ahead. On behalf of the Board, I thank Justin Boschetti and the team who have worked tirelessly to adapt to the ever changing circumstances in the last year and we are extremely grateful for these efforts.

We are immensely grateful for the City of Sydney's ongoing support as our Principal Sponsor. This commitment allows us to continue providing Sydney audiences world-class performances in the very heart of our city. Our sincere

gratitude to the Lord Mayor of Sydney, Cr. Clover Moore and Councillors for their encouragement and advocacy for our success in managing this key cultural asset.

We continue to reach new audiences through our valued media partner TimeOut and acknowledge our corporate partners AV1, JPJ Audio, Chalk Hill, Claymore Wines, Fisher Fine Wines and Young Henrys.

Our thoughts and well wishes go out to every single member of the Australian arts community who have been so significantly impacted by COVID-19. We look forward to welcoming you, and our valued audiences, back to the City Recital Hall as soon as possible.

# CEO'S MESSAGE



A year has passed since my appointment as CEO, and it has certainly been an interesting journey navigating the continually evolving world we now inhabit. During the past twelve months, despite the lockdowns, postponements, and capacity restrictions we have successfully supported the artists and presenters on our stage with the City Recital Hall's renowned sense of care and attention. We have also laid the foundations for our revitalised self-presents program and worked in partnership with our colleagues at the City of Sydney to develop the plans for our capital renewal program.

City Recital Hall's programming responded to the shifting landscape of the past year. We presented Sarah Blasko (as seen on the cover of this report) and Tim Freedman in November as part of Destination NSW's Great Southern Nights initiative. In January, with support from the City of Sydney and in partnership with our neighbours at Ragazzi Wine and Pasta, we presented six performances in a Summer Lunch Series featuring a range of artists including Sweet Whirl, Andy Golledge, Caitlin Harnett, Duo Histoire and Fem Belling. Our longtime audience favourite A Little Lunch Music series continued to entertain and featured a memorable sellout with the James Morrison Quartet in June.

We also hosted world premieres by Australian composers Paul Stanhope with the Sydney Chamber Choir and Paul Dean with the Australian World Orchestra. As always, our Key Presenters worked hard to deliver outstanding programming to their subscribers and our team developed new ways of working to support our partners through live streaming, recording presentations and adaptive guidelines to safely host our audiences and artists.

Our Principal Sponsor, the City of Sydney, continues to provide essential support and I extend my thanks to the Lord Mayor of Sydney, Cr. Clover Moore, Councillors, Monica Barone, Bill Carter and all the staff across the Creative City and Property teams.

I would like to acknowledge the commitment and leadership of the Board. My particular thanks go to Renata Kaldor AO, who completed her five-year tenure in March, and our incoming Chair, Rachel Launders. Both Renata and Rachel provided vital support and attention as we worked through the challenges and opportunities that coronavirus has presented.

As we have come to expect, the City Recital Hall team displayed remarkable resilience and commitment to our mission in creating exceptional live music experiences for our audiences and artists. 2021 has seen the arrival of a number of new staff members and I look forward to working with our extraordinary people in the year ahead.

Finally, I would like to offer my personal thanks to the artists and audience members who have entrusted City Recital Hall to celebrate the joy of live music. As custodians of this magnificent venue, we exist for our artists and audiences. I look forward to welcoming you back.





# HOW AUDIENCES DESCRIBED THEIR EXPERIENCE


MULTIPLE RESPONSES RECORDED



### WHY AUDIENCES ATTENDED





# TRAINING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

City Recital Hall is committed to fostering the arts professionals of the future through formal traineeships, and to supporting our sector through participation in professional development opportunities.

With the support of Training Services NSW, Apprenticeship Support Australia, ACFIPS (NSW Industry Training Advisory Board), and the Federal Government **Employment Initiative Boosting** Apprenticeship Commencements, we continued our support of Morgan Higgin's development in the role of Production Assistant, extending her Traineeship under a Certificate IV in Arts Administration. Morgan has had the opportunity to gain experience in the many areas of a performing arts venue, including: technical production, stage management, event management and administration.

### **EMERGING ARTISTS**

We continue to pursue opportunities to engage with emerging artists to support their musical careers and introduce these artists to our audiences.

In March 2021, the students of the Australian National Academy of Music appeared on our stage in *A Little Lunch Music: Figaro For Winds*. This performance transformed *The Marriage of Figaro* into a beguiling work for wind ensemble, led by ANAM Artistic Director Nick Deutsch, and narration of Figaro's many adventures by actor Bethany Simons.

Our Summer Lunch Series included a well-received solo performance in the Angel Place laneway by Melbourne singer-songwriter Sweet Whirl (Esther Edquist).

And our new contemporary music series *Singular Voices*, which has been postponed due to border and lockdown restrictions is committed to including a range of emerging artists in both headline and support plays.

## **EXTERNAL VENUES**

City Recital Hall provided customer support and online services to events presented at several Sydney based not-for-profit venues including Sydney Town Hall and Verbrugghen Hall. Although many of the events prepared in 2021 were cancelled due to operating restrictions we look forward to continuing these supporting services in 2022.

# **ACCESSIBILITY**

City Recital Hall aims to provide exceptional experiences to audiences, accessibility is therefore an ongoing priority through infrastructure and exploring opportunities for attendance for those with specific access needs.

The auditorium is equipped with a hearing loop, accessible seating, designated parking spaces and lifts, and courtesy wheelchairs available for all performances. Our website incorporates accessibility features to facilitate access for our audiences.

Concession priced tickets totalled 11% of all tickets sold by City Recital Hall, and 28 Companion Card tickets were issued.

# **NEW AUDIENCES**

City Recital Hall is increasing our offering and engagement opportunities with new audiences. Our new CRH Presents program of contemporary popular music is increasing our appeal to younger audiences with Julia Jacklin's planned solo performance in the *Singular Voices* series, initially scheduled for 4 June 2021, attracting 65% first time ticket purchases and a significantly younger demographic. We are also developing partnerships with a number of not-forprofit organisations, including Playwave, to provide low-cost tickets to bring more young people into the Hall.

# **FREE AND LOW-COST**

This year, 3,778 people attended our free and low-cost performances across *This Sounds Like Science* and *A Little Lunch Music*.

This Sounds Like Science, a series of lunchtime talks hosted in partnership with Inspiring Australia (NSW), continued to fascinate audiences with discussions linking science and music by leading Australian researchers. This year 611 people attended the two free events we were able to bring to the stage this year: The Sounds of Coronavirus and Music and the Climate Crisis.

Our long-running lunchtime concert series, A Little Lunch Music, co-curated with Kathryn Selby AM, delighted a total audience of 3,167 attendees with diverse musical experiences. We were able to present six of the twelve planned concerts ranging from the Australian National Academy of Music (ANAM) wind quartet with actor Bethany Simons for Figaro for Winds, to the sold-out James Morrison Quartet.



We approached programming with positivity and optimism over the past year and like everyone across the arts community, we were repeatedly disappointed by cancelled plans to bring artists to our supportive and dedicated audiences. Undeterred, we continue to work towards delivering the many contemporary and classical artists whose planned performances were postponed. We came out of lockdown on 5 September 2020 and welcomed audiences at reduced capacity until March 2021. We enjoyed three months of full capacity from March, until we returned to lockdown on 26 June 2021.

# **GREAT SOUTHERN NIGHTS**

In November, we rekindled our in-house programming with two limited capacity performances supported by Destination NSW's *Great Southern Nights* initiative. Sarah Blasko performed a solo show that was the culmination of a series of developmental performances for her upcoming album together with the classics including the much-loved *As Day Follows Night*. Tim Freedman brought one of his rare solo tours to City Recital Hall to launch The Whitlams' new single *Ballad of Bertie Kidd*, together with reinvented classics like *Blow Up the Pokies* and *No Aphrodisiac*.

# **SUMMER LUNCH SERIES**

We presented a series of six lunchtime performances outside in Angel Place on both Saturday and Sunday across three weekends in January and February accompanied by exquisite dining by Ragazzi Wine & Pasta. These intimate 100-cap shows, with stage set design by Wollongong artist Eamonn McLoughlin, were musically focussed and featured emerging and established artists. Duo Histoire dazzled on saxophone and guitar; Andy Golledge and guest Caitlin Harnett, who performed the next day charmed and caroused representing Sydney's burgeoning new Country scene; Melbourne artist, Sweet Whirl (Esther Edquist) played an engaging set on bass and digital piano; and crowd favourite, Fem Belling performed an extra show to fill in for Emma Donovan who was locked down in Melbourne.

# TEDDY TAHU RHODES & GUY NOBLE

Acclaimed baritone Teddy Tahu Rhodes joined popular pianist and conductor Guy Noble for a concert of powerful and rapturous songs and delicate classical arias. Rhodes mesmerised audiences with his renowned vocal colour and nuance and displayed the breadth of his vocal skills with works from *The Barber of Seville, South Pacific*, Schubert's Lieder to the swagger of *Clancy of The Overflow*.

# SYDNEY CHAMBER CHOIR: PAUL STANHOPE – A NEW REQUIEM

We were thrilled to present the world premiere of award-winning composer and former Sydney Chamber Choir Music Director Paul Stanhope's *Requiem*, a major new work of transcendent beauty and healing that brought together the Latin Mass for the Dead with poetry by Emily Dickinson, Mary Elizabeth Frye and Oodgeroo Noonuccal. This formed the centrepiece of a program exploring themes of mortality, hope, ritual and commemoration featuring works by Tomás Luis de Victoria, Mary Finsterer, James MacMillan, and Indigenous composer Brenda Gifford.

# CASEY DONOVAN IN CONCERT

Casey Donovan brought her powerhouse vocals to the stage in a show of iconic hits arranged by Musical Director Daniel Edmonds. Woven with stories and her unmistakable wit and charm, Casey Donovan in Concert featured the music of Eva Cassidy, Bette Midler, Adele, Ed Sheeran, and Beyoncé.

# **GREEK FESTIVAL OF** SYDNEY: TSITSANIS. HATZIDAKIS, XARCHAKOS, THEODORAKIS: 200 ΧΡΟΝΙΑ ΕΛΕΥΘΕΡΗ ΕΛΛΑΔΑ

The fifth annual Greek Orthodox Community of NSW co-production featured international soloist Dimitris Basis, together with a Greek band, a symphony orchestra and a choir, under the direction of conductor George Ellis. The show marked the 200th anniversary of the beginning of the Greek War of Independence, and featured songs of revolution, liberation and empowerment created over several decades by four great composers of the twentieth and twenty-first centuries: Vassilis Tsitsanis, Manos Hatzidakis, Stavros Xarchakos and Mikis Theodorakis.

# SINGULAR VOICES

This new CRH Presents series announced its first season in March. inviting contemporary artists of the highest calibre to step forth on one of the most visually and sonically beautiful stages in Australia, dissolving the boundary between listener and song with only the barest embellishment to their exceptional voices. They will present innovative shows perfectly suited to the Hall; contemporary music without overpowering its acoustics. Singular Voices offers artists the unique opportunity to further explore their music in a way that transcends their usual touring projects. The first announcement included rare solo turns by Marlon Williams, Julia Jacklin, Robert Forster, Kee'ahn with Babitha, featuring opening acts including Maple Glider and The Apartments' Peter Milton Walsh.

# A LITTLE LUNCH MUSIC

This popular and long-running series, programmed in conjunction with Kathryn Selby AM, reached new heights in 2021 with a sellout performance featuring the legendary James Morrison Quartet. A broad program of genres and periods is represented with highlights including the Australian National Music Academy's exploration of The Marriage of Figaro, the rarely performed Brahms Horn Trio and the dual piano version of Saint-Saëns's Carnival of the Animals with a new narration by Hilary Bell performed by Benita Collings.

# **LIVESTREAMING**

As the world moved to digital delivery during lockdown City Recital Hall was proud to host a series of live streams produced by Fane. These events presented live conversations with authors, actors and personalities ranging from Armistead Maupin and Sir lan McKellen to Graham Norton, Nigella Lawson and Matthew McConaughey. Continuing a multi-year partnership, we also hosted a virtual heat of the Australian Poetry Slam.

# THIS SOUNDS LIKE **SCIENCE**

This enlightening, free, lecture series presented ground-breaking scientific research and invited audiences to listen to sound and music from a new perspective. Dr Mark Temple. a Senior Lecturer in Molecular Biology and formerly the drummer of The Hummingbirds, performed his Coronacode Music and Professor Angela Moles, a plant ecologist at UNSW, amazed the audience with stories of how adaptable our ecosystems are in a warming world.





# VENUE HIRERS

Our calendar of activity has again been complemented by concerts and events from Australia's leading presenters, promoters, ensembles and artists. The important addition of venue hiring contributes to the musical richness of City Recital Hall's program and productively draws new audiences to the Hall.

GOVERNANCE

The City Recital Hall Limited Board saw several changes during the 2020/21 financial year: Rachel Launders was appointed Chair with Ronen Ghosh and Scott Phillips joining the Board in April 2021. This year also saw the departure of Founding Chair Renata Kaldor AO, Timothy Cox AO, and Louise Walsh who have each made an invaluable contribution to the Board.

The Board consists of eight directors who guide the direction of the company through their experience in music, performing arts, business strategy, finance, legal, governance, marketing and media, programming and community engagement.

The Board met on eight occasions, and implemented a number of key actions including:

- Setting strategic priorities for the company
- Approving the annual budget and monthly financial reports
- Ensuring compliance and effective risk management
- Endorsing a new programming direction for CRH Presents
- Approving an organisation change process introducing an executive team.



There are four sub-committees: Audit and Risk, Nominations, Artistic, Development.
